The hilarious back and forth between the rabbit-obsessed narrator and Owl will cause you and your little ones to laugh out loud while also learning lots of new words to build their vocabulary. The story of Barnabus is an exciting read for older readers who are struggling to push against the idea of perfection and find acceptance in the world; younger readers will love to explore the Fan Brother's beautiful illustrations to find their favorite flawed pet. For ages 8-12

Authors Josh Berk and Sandra Mitchell set their story during 1983 at Camp Sweetwater in Ohio. Campers Corryn and Tez soon discover that the camp is actually a location of terror that dates back to when it originated in the 1700s under another much darker name. Readers will quickly be pulled into the story from the view of the two narrators as they rush to discover the cause of the frights with age-appropriate touches of gore and humor woven throughout. The authors also have a sequel planned making this a great series opener if your reader can handle the scares!

When Ellie and her family are forced to move to the mountain wilderness of Maine during the Great Depression, they each struggle to find their place in their new circumstances. Ellie's mother and sister resent the wildness around them, especially after a tragic accident throws their father into a coma, but Ellie seems to blossom in the freedom, friendships, and knowledge she finds in the woods. Through Ellie's journey, the reader is able to see the struggle we all eventually face of meeting the expectations of those around you while trying to stay true to yourself. In a year that seemed to take a lot out of everyone, this lovely novel serves as a reminder that life's unexpected tragic events can be world shattering, but there is always a way to have hope and find a sense of peace in your new normal.

In this sequel to the Newbery Medal winning *The One and Only Ivan*, Bob, a small mutt with a big attitude, narrates the next chapter with his animal pals Ivan, a silverback gorilla, and Ruby, a young elephant. Bob now has a comfortable home with a human friend, and he still gets to see Ivan and Ruby at a nearby sanctuary, but something – no, *someone* – is missing. When a hurricane hits, Bob sets out on a dangerous journey to find his long-lost sister with the help of Ivan and Ruby. Told with humor and heart, this novel will have you rooting for scrappy little Bob!

For ages 10-14

Subtitled "A stomach-churning look at the animal poop, pee, vomit and secretions that people have eaten (and often still do)", this book is *not* for the weak-stomached reader! However, if you have a middle grade reader that loves gross and interesting history this is the book for them. Promising to elicit gasps, groans, and lots of laughs, this non-fiction book tells stories from Ancient Rome, Medieval and Colonial times, as well as more recent times when people have ingested unimaginable things - on purpose. At the high school where the New York Times' bestselling graphic novelist Gene Luen Yang teaches, all everyone talks about is basketball. And although he doesn't even like basketball, the men's varsity team is having such a great year that he just can't help but get swept up in the excitement. This non-fiction graphic novel is the perfect choice for those who love exciting non-fiction, graphic novels, or sports.

Incendiary

Zoraida Córdova

As a memory thief, Renata was used by the crown to carry out the King's Wrath, a siege that resulted in the deaths of thousands. Now she is one of the rebellious Whispers working against the crown. When her commander Dez is taken captive, Renata complete his mission herself. But upon returning to court, she uncovers a secret in her past that could change the fate of the entire kingdom. Inspired by Inquisition Spain, give this one to fans of Sarah Maas's *Throne of Glass* series and other fantasy lovers.

The Mermaid, the Witch, and the Sea

Adventure on the high seas filled with intrigue, romance, and magic. The pirate Florian has always done whatever it takes to survive. Lady Evelyn is on her way to an arranged marriage. When the crew of the *Dove* enslaves the wealthy crew, Evelyn and Florian decide to take their fates into their own hands – no matter the cost.

The Plain Janes

When Jane Beckles moves from the city to a boring suburb, she by chance meets three other girls named Jane. Together, they form the Plain Janes, dedicated to using art to transform their lackluster existence and neighborhood. Originally published in 2006, this beautiful new edition boasts brand new art and the complete collection, with the inclusion of a new story. A must-read for all who love graphic novels.
